





Okanagan College 1st Year Post-Secondary Transfer

Students can enroll in **1 to 2 1st-year Okanagan College transferable courses** that fit into their secondary school schedule.

Course selection must align with the student's documented education/transition plan to post-secondary.

Post secondary course(s) must be transferable as per the <u>BC Transfer Guide</u>.

When to Apply?

Grade II's must apply prior to May 30th.



Youth Apprenticeship Program

Start building your career in the trades before you graduate high school: Grades 10 - 12



Earn 16 Credits

Complete **48O work hours** and earn credits toward your high school graduation while building real-world skills



Get Paid to Learn

Receive a paycheck as you develop professional skills and gain valuable industry experience




\$1,000 Scholarship

Dual Credit Programs - Seat Selection

Consistent Attendance

Strong attendance demonstrates commitment and responsibility essential for Dual Credit Programs.

Graduation Plan

Students should meet with their school's Career Coordinator to develop a Transition Plan to ensure they are on track to meet all graduation requirements.

Career Exploration

Evidence of career exploration ensures dual credit programs align with future aspirations.

Prerequisites

Students need to make sure they've completed all required prerequisites and a demonstrated readiness to succeed in post-secondary.

Dual Credit - Tuition & Cost


School District pays for:

Base tuition. Sponsored tuition amounts vary by program ~ \$1708 - \$5497

Student/Family pays for:

Books, supplies, and post-secondary student fees. ~ \$100 - \$3,000
